Mehlville School District named 2019 Missouri District of Character

Mehlville School District has been re-certified as a Missouri State District of Character by Character.org. The program recognized the district for demonstrating its use of character development to drive a positive impact on academics, student behavior and school climate.

“We are thrilled to receive this distinction as a Missouri District of Character for the second time,” said Dr. Jeff Bresler, assistant superintendent, supervision of schools. “Character education has been an important part of our curriculum for decades, and it is embedded in the daily routines and practices of each of our schools. In the past year, we’ve extended our work in character education to develop the Portrait of a Graduate, traits

we’d like to see in every Mehlville School District graduate.”

The Portrait of a Graduate traits include global and ethical, self-aware, persistent, communicator, and creative and critical thinker. These desired soft skills, which were determined by a committee of staff, parents and community members, are taught by blending character education and innovative instruction to equip students with 21st century skills.

Criteria for the designation are based on Character.org’s 11 Principles of Effective Character Education, which includes providing students with opportunities for moral action, fostering shared leadership and engaging families and communities as partners in character-building efforts.

District earns near perfect score on Missouri’s Annual Performance Report

Mehlville School District earned a 99.6 percent on the state’s annual performance report (APR), ranking among the highest performing public school districts in the St. Louis region and Missouri. Mehlville School District has also earned the highest level of accreditation from the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE).

The APR is part of Missouri’s school accreditation system. The standards measured by the APR include:

- **Academic achievement:** Overall district performance on Missouri Assessment Program (MAP) state standardized tests
- **Subgroup achievement:** The achievement of subgroups of students, which includes African-American/black students, Hispanic students, students eligible for free/reduced lunch, students with limited English proficiency and students with special education needs
- **College and career readiness:** Achievement on standardized tests such as the ACT, COMPASS, ASVAB; Advanced Placement assessments, Project Lead The Way classes and dual credit classes; and college and career placement following high school graduation
- **Attendance rate**
- **Graduation rate**

From 2014-2017, Mehlville’s average APR score was 92.4 percent. The 2018 score is the highest ever for the district. Improvements in academic achievement and subgroup achievement scores contributed to the increase in the district’s APR score in 2018.

“Achievement scores take into account our average MAP scores over the past three years, year-over-year improvement in MAP scores, and the growth individual students make on MAP tests,” said Dr. Brian Smith, assistant superintendent for curriculum, assessment and professional development. “We received more points this year for our individual growth in subgroup achievement in math and English language arts. In 2018, we exceeded the expected growth in these areas.”

While he’s thrilled with the APR score, Superintendent Dr. Chris Gaines cautions that DESE has made numerous changes to the MAP tests, which can cause fluctuations in APR scores.

“Over the past five years, there have been four different tests set to three different sets of standards,” Dr. Gaines said. “This makes year-to-year improvement comparisons meaningless.”

According to DESE, completely new assessments in English language arts and math were administered in 2017-18 due to changes in learning standards. Therefore, it is important to note that the 2017-18 results are not comparable with results from previous tests in those subjects. More than 2,500 Missouri teachers and other stakeholders crafted the Missouri Learning Standards that were adopted in spring 2016. The new standards were developed with a goal of setting higher expectations for students, which was reflected in a more challenging, teacher-developed set of state assessments.

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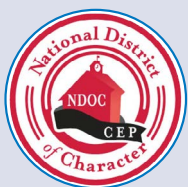

FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT

Keeping track of our progress

One of my responsibilities as a member of the Mehlville Board of Education is to hold the school district accountable for the promises it makes to students, parents, taxpayers and the greater community. I wanted to provide you with an update on a few promises we've made.

Prop R spending

Prop R was passed in November 2015 to increase the tax rate by 49 cents, which increases revenue by an estimated \$8,044,000. While this revenue varies year-to-year based on the value of the property within our district boundaries, we promised to spend at least \$7.2 million on specific items to benefit our students. The remaining funds would go toward general operating expenses. Those items specifically budgeted for by Prop R included after school activities and clubs, 5 English learner teachers and 11 interventionists, professional development for staff, increased communications, classroom supplies, and equipment, technology, buses and capital improvements. All of these investments help us to continually improve our students' educational experience.

In fiscal year 2018, which covered the 2017-2018 school year, Mehlville School District spent \$7.5 million on Prop R targeted items, and the remaining \$500,000 went toward

general operating expenses. You can see all of the expenditures in the agenda from our Nov. 19, 2018, board meeting. All board meeting agendas are posted online at mehlvilleschooldistrict.com/about_us/board_of_education.

Continuous improvement at each school

The highlight of our meetings this year have been the presentations made by school principals. At each meeting, two principals share their school's achievement data. They share their celebrations alongside their plans for improvement. Behind each data point is a student, and it's clear our schools are working hard to help all of our students learn and thrive.

Board approves calendar for 2020-2021 school year

The Mehlville Board of Education approved the calendar for the 2020-2021 school year during their Dec. 20 meeting.

The first day of school will be Thursday, Aug. 13, 2020. The last day of school is dependent on snow days but could be as early as May 19, 2021. School year calendars are available online at mehlvilleschooldistrict.com/calendars

School calendars are developed by the calendar committee, which includes school district staff and parents.

The board also approved the addition of one non-school day during the 2019-2020 school year calendar. The district

typically does not have school on general elections and presidential primary elections. The district was notified that March 10, 2020, is a presidential primary. The board

has decided to revise the calendar to make this a non-school day, using one of two built-in snow days.



Felton, Schartner to retain positions on Board of Education

Two Mehlville School District citizens have filed their candidacy for two positions on the Mehlville Board of Education. They are both incumbents: Larry Felton and Kevin Schartner.

Under the provisions of Missouri law, if the number of candidates who file is the same as the number of positions to be filled by the election (two), there will be no election. Since this is the case, at the April organizational meeting of the Board of Education, the district will swear in these candidates.

Felton and Schartner will each serve three-year terms.

How we're increasing opportunities for high school students

Each year the school year seems to go by more quickly. I realize that this year has the same number of days as the year prior, and time isn't moving more quickly. What is happening is that, as we get older, each year becomes an ever-smaller proportion of our lives.

As we go through the second half of the school year, we are reflecting on the current year while planning for the future. As I look back on the first half of the 2018-2019 school year, I find there are a lot of accomplishments to celebrate. Here are a few things that come to mind.

- Mehlville School District received the highest score to date on the state's Annual Performance Report, validating our educators' commitment to continuous improvement.
- Both administrators at Bernard Middle School received state recognition. Lauren Cumming, assistant principal, was named the Missouri Assistant Principal of the Year. Lori Sullivan, principal, received the Consummate Professional Award from the Missouri Association of Secondary School Principals.
- Two students are National Merit Finalists: Morgan Allen from Oakville High School, and Harrison Hong from Mehlville High School.
- While retirements are bittersweet, they provide an opportunity to reflect on an individual's service to our students, staff and community. Three long-time principals have announced their retirement at the end of this school year, and I hope you join me in thanking them for their tireless efforts teaching kids. I wish Oakville High Principal Jan Kellerman, Bernard Middle Principal Lori Sullivan and Mehlville High Principal Denise Swanger all the best.

As we look to the next school year, we have a lot to be excited about. In 2019-2020, we will launch the Academy at each of our middle schools. The program will start with incoming sixth-graders and grow as these students progress through middle school. Interest in the program has been strong.

At the high school level, we have some new classes available next fall that combine math with business and construction. These classes offer a work-like experience for more relevant and engaging student learning. We are also formalizing our Early College program where students will spend their day at St. Louis Community College. These students will earn 42 college credits —

close to an associates degree — that can transfer to any public college or university in Missouri.

As we look further into the future at our high schools, we are expanding internship and apprenticeship availability for students. For the 2020-2021 school year, we will have a formal process so students can earn credit by showing subject area competency rather than relying on seat time in a classroom.

High schools across the country are providing more work-based learning experiences for students. Mehlville High and Oakville High are at the forefront, collaborating with colleges, universities, business partners and other school districts to expand the options available to our students.

The old saying "time flies when you're having fun" holds true for Mehlville School District. Between our celebrations and our plans for the future, it is certainly a great time for Mehlville School District.

Personalized learning is focus of the Academy middle school experience

There is a new opportunity for students entering sixth grade in the 2019-2020 school year: The Academy.

The Academy is a middle school extension of our existing options for concentrated and sustained personalized learning. Currently, the district offers this style of education through MOSAIC Elementary School and MyPath, a course high school students can create around their own career interests. Mehlville School District has not had a formalized program in the middle schools, and the Academy changes that.

The Academy is a learning environment housed within each middle school. Academy classes present students with blended learning opportunities, including project-based learning, inquiry-based learning, personalized learning

and guided teacher expertise. Students in the Academy are empowered to shape how they learn the curriculum throughout the school year.

The Academy courses will be a combination of two classes. For example, an Academy course may be a two-hour class that blends math and science. Or an Academy course may be a three-hour class that blends English language arts and social studies. Any combination of classes may occur, but each Academy will offer two courses that combine two content areas. Combining content areas allows students to develop and demonstrate higher-level thinking.

Facility Steering Committee starts work to determine building needs

In 2020, the district has the opportunity to invest in its facilities and operations without increasing the existing tax rate. However, this requires placing a proposition on the ballot and the support of the community.

In order to decide what, if anything, to place on the ballot, the district has formed a Facility Steering Committee to gather feedback on facilities, determine needed projects and prioritize those projects at each school and across the district. The steering committee will make a recommendation to the Mehlville School District Board of Education on what should be placed on the 2020 ballot.

The committee, which is comprised of staff and parents from each school, and community members, began meeting in December. Through the spring of 2020, the committee will meet at each school to review feedback from parent, staff and student facility surveys and to begin prioritizing needs. So far, the committee has visited Washington Middle School and Oakville Middle School. Patterns of needs observed to date include facility upgrades related to safety and accessibility, HVAC and modernized learning spaces.

“Every committee member will obtain the big picture of facility needs across the district while also being informed of the needs of each individual building or campus,” said Dr. Chris Gaines, superintendent. “This will provide them with both the in-depth knowledge and district-wide perspective if they choose to make a recommendation to place a proposition on the ballot in November 2020.”

Parents and students are encouraged to provide their feedback on their school’s facility when surveys are distributed the month prior to the committee’s visit. Members of the community are welcome to provide their feedback during the open houses prior to each committee meeting. Key Facts About Facilities

- Mehlville School District has 1.8 million square feet of classrooms, athletic facilities, cafeterias and other learning spaces under roof. (That’s almost the size of 38 football fields!)
- We fund upkeep and repairs at just \$1.50 per square foot. At this funding level, Mehlville School District has more facilities needs than funds.
- In 2016 voters approved a tax transfer of 4 cents. This year, that tax transfer generates \$708,000 to fund roofing and HVAC projects. The tax transfer ends in 2025.
- The last significant investment in Mehlville School District facilities was in 2000. Most St. Louis County school districts have made three significant investments in facilities since 2000.

\$1.9 million saved by refinancing Certificate of Participation

The Mehlville Board of Education approved the refinancing of the district’s Series 2009 Certificate of Participation (COP) during their December meeting. By refinancing this COP, the district will save about \$1,876,000.

The refinance will replace the 2009 COP, which has a 6.85 percent interest rate, with the 2019 COP with a 3 percent interest rate and an accelerated payment schedule. All of Mehlville School District’s COPs are scheduled to be paid off by 2022.

Certificates of Participation are alternatives to municipal bonds that are used by school districts to make improvements to facilities and infrastructure.

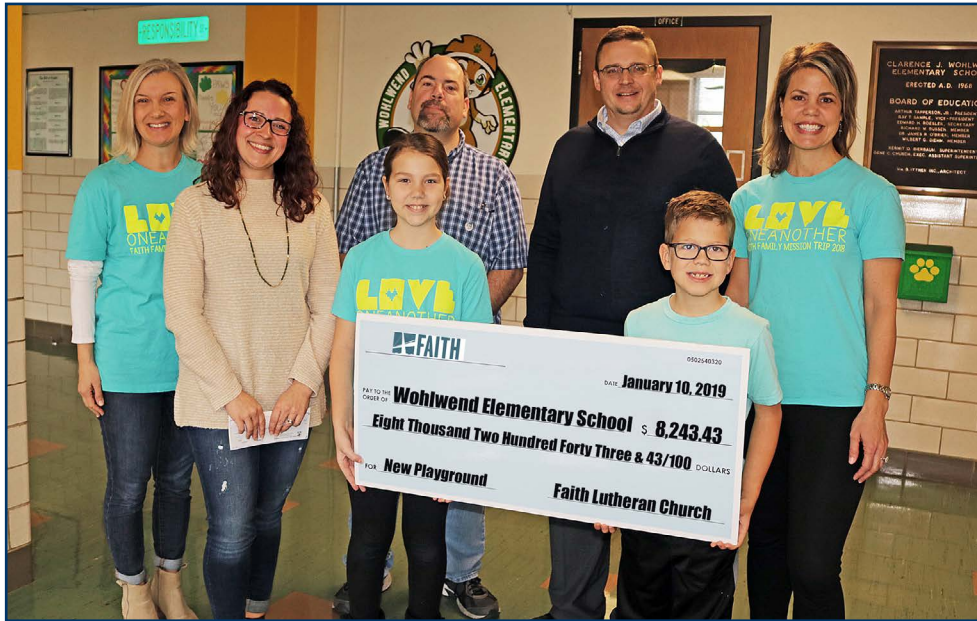
“This is one of 11 refinances that we have completed since 2010,” said Marshall

Crutcher, chief financial officer for Mehlville School District. “The total savings for all of these refinances is \$11.2 million. Ensuring that we take advantage of more favorable interest rates for our COPs is just one of the ways we are being responsible stewards of taxpayer funds.”

Mehlville School District’s bond rating has been upgraded from AA- to AA status. This bond rating indicates that Mehlville School District has a very strong, and improving, creditworthiness relative to other U.S. municipal or tax-exempt issuers or issues.

“This higher bond rating will be helpful in securing the best financing for any future bond issues,” Crutcher said.

A place where everyone can play



Faith Lutheran Church donated \$8,243 for the accessible playground at Wohlwend Elementary.

Wohlwend Elementary School has drafted plans for a new, accessible playground – the first of its kind in South County. The new playground would replace the current play equipment, which is more than 25 years old.

“This playground would be amazing for our students who rely on wheelchairs or who have other mobility challenges,” said Dr. Dave Meschke, principal at Wohlwend. The playground has a ramp to make the top section accessible to all. In addition to slides and climbing structures, the playground also has built-in activities, like drums, that all kids can access. A safe, accessible surface will also be installed.

The playground will cost \$110,000, and the manufacturer, Cunningham Recreation, has agreed to cover 50 percent of the cost. The school’s PTO, the Wildcat PAWS, is working to raise the remaining \$55,000. So far they’ve raised \$15,500.

“A playground like this is definitely needed in South County. The closest accessible playgrounds are in Kirkwood and Herculaneum,” Dr. Meschke said. Once installed, members of the community can use the playground in the evenings and weekends when school is not in session.

Students explore jobs during Oakville Middle Career Fair

Oakville Middle students had the opportunity to explore careers that interest them during the school’s annual Career Fair in November. About 35 professionals, in fields ranging from engineering to journalism, shared information about their vocations and answered student questions.

“We’ve been working with our students to identify their interests and strengths and how these might fit well with certain career fields,” said Emily Lehr, counselor at Oakville Middle School. “The Career Fair was a great opportunity for the students to explore a wide variety of careers and to talk directly with people who are working in those fields. It also gave them the opportunity to practice those soft skills that they will need once they start interviewing. It was great to see the kids dressed in professional dress, shaking hands, introducing themselves, making eye contact and writing thank you notes.”

Learning to lead

More than half of students at Point Elementary School participate in a leadership role. From traffic leaders who help keep kids safe in the parent pick-up line, to makerspace leaders who keep the lab clean and organized, students have a variety of opportunities to develop leadership skills while taking ownership in their school. Some students even get to be mascot leaders who wear the school’s Eagle costume at special events or movie stars who speak in the school’s weekly video, “Spotlight on Point.”

“I love to see kids shine,” said Dr. Shannon Pike, principal at Point. “They’re so excited, and all of their leadership activities wrap right into academics.” It’s part of how Point begins to instill traits of Mehlville School District’s Portrait of a Graduate, like being a good communicator, a creative and critical thinker, and self-aware.

Breaking down barriers to learning

When students in Paula Kennedy’s and Devon Drikow’s classes returned from winter break, they found a new passageway in their classroom. What was once a wall between the two kindergarten classes at Hagemann Elementary School had been opened up – and so, too, did the learning opportunities for kids.

Kennedy and Drikow are now team-teaching more. When one teacher leads whole-group instruction, the other can work one-on-one with students or with a small group of students. “It allows us to teach deeper because we have more on-the-spot teachable moments,” Drikow said.

It’s also created a greater sense of connectedness between the two teachers.

“I don’t feel like I’m teaching in isolation anymore,” said kindergarten teacher Paula Kennedy. “It’s fostering creativity and collaboration.”

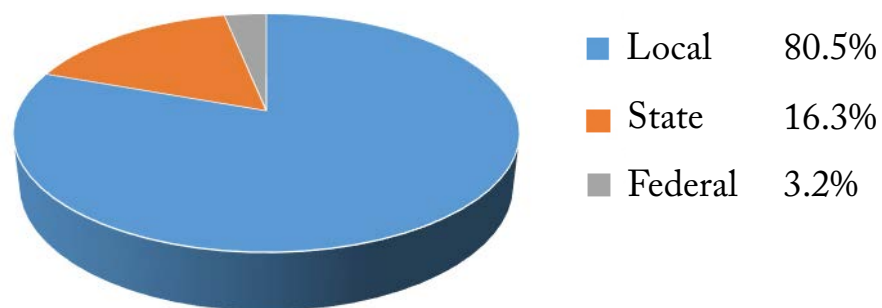

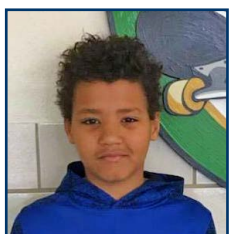

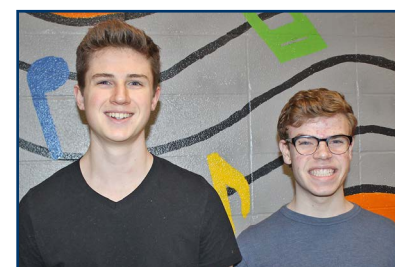
