New teaching positions were created to better support all students

Mehlville School District has added two new teaching interventionists at each school this year to ensure better support for our students. These positions are being paid for using federal COVID-19 relief funds.

Interventionists are teachers who specialize in certain subjects to help all students improve. Principals evaluated their school's needs and hired interventionists that would be most beneficial for their students. Some schools, like Beasley Elementary, hired a math and a reading interventionist.

"When I go into the classroom, it's a universal learning approach where the teacher and I are teaching all students before breaking into small groups," said Julie Werton, Beasley Elementary math interventionist. During small group time, Werton can determine who understands and who is struggling with what's being taught so she can support and challenge each student.

Schools also had the option to hire social-emotional learning interventionists. The role of a social-emotional interventionist is to help students develop skills to prevent their emotions from getting in the way of their learning.

"Since we're still at the beginning of the year, my job right now is pushing into the classrooms and serving as an emotional coach and talking through the big feelings and problems we may be seeing in classrooms," said Morgan Mueller, Trautwein Elementary social-emotional learning interventionist. "I think it's super important for social-emotional interventionists to push into the classroom because it models for students who are struggling what it needs to look like, while allowing them to still be with their peers. If their classmates have just seen them have a tough moment, they also get to see the resolution."

Social-emotional interventionists also pull students from the classroom at times to provide a neutral space to learn how to manage their emotions, talk through

their feelings, and develop strategies to better handle challenging situations in the future.

"This position gives us the ability to identify students who are struggling and pour resources and interventions into them and see what progress we can make," Mueller said.

Additionally, social-emotional learning interventionists are working with all elementary school students on the zones of regulation. Zones of regulation is a teaching framework to help students learn to identify and control their emotions and reactions.

While the federal funds supporting these positions are only allotted for three years, this level of student and teacher support is something the district hopes to continue.

"We believe in this investment in supporting our students," said Dr. Laurie Tretter-Larkin, director of fine arts and federal programs. "We're going to be tracking how the addition of interventionists impacts our students and hope to provide this level of support for our students into the future."

The hiring of these interventionists is one way the district is using federal relief funds to support students over the next three years. The district is also increasing opportunities for student activities and clubs, providing academic support before and after school, and using funds for heating, ventilation and cooling upgrades.

Candidate Filing for Board of Education opens Dec. 7

Any person wishing to file for the Mehlville School District Board of Education may do so in the Mehlville School District Administration Building, 3120 Lemay Ferry Road, St. Louis, MO 63125. Filing will be held Tuesday, Dec. 7, 2021, through Tuesday, Dec. 28, 2021.

From Tuesday, Dec. 7, through Wednesday, Dec. 22, filing hours will be between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. The district office will be closed and no filings will be accepted Thursday, Dec. 23, 2021, through Monday, Dec. 27, 2021, for winter break. The final day for filing will be Tuesday, Dec. 28, 2021, from 3 to 5 p.m.

Except for the first and last day of filing, filings will be taken by appointment only. No filings will be accepted when the office is closed due to inclement weather or in the event of a closure due to the COVID-19 global pandemic. An election for two seats on the board will be held Tuesday, April 5, 2022. The seats carry a three-year term.

Under the provisions of Missouri Statute Section 115.124, if the number of candidates who file is equal to the number of positions to be filled by the election (two), no election will be held. However, if the number of candidates filing exceeds the number of positions, the annual school board election will be held on April 5, 2022. Per Mehlville School District Policy BBB-1, the names of qualified candidates shall be placed on the ballot in order of filing.

Looking forward to the future

In my State of the District address this year, I focused on three important issues for Mehlville School District: enrollment figures, the new strategic plan and Prop S facility improvements. Here are some highlights from the address.

Enrollment is up for the 2021-2022 school year.

Following slow declines in enrollment over the past several years, the 2021-2022 September enrollment count is up slightly. There are currently 9,974 students in grades K-12 enrolled in Mehlville School District, up from 9,765 last year. This enrollment is above our demographer's projected enrollment. However, these projections were made before the COVID-19 pandemic. We will conduct an additional demographic study in the fall of 2022. Demographic research helps us plan future budgets, staffing and facility needs.

A new strategic plan has been approved by the board.

Mehlville School District prepared a renewed strategic plan that will guide our work through the 2025-2026 school year. That plan was approved by the Board of Education on Sept. 16. This document helps us set high expectations for ourselves and our students, focus on continuous improvement and ensure our energy is directed towards achieving our goals. The first two projects funded by Prop S have been completed.

Prop S was passed by voters in April 2021 to complete projects to improve

Board approves 2021 blended tax rate

The Mehlville Board of Education unanimously approved the 2021 blended tax rate of \$3.6598 at its annual tax rate hearing on Tuesday, Sept. 21. The blended rate is about 14 cents less than the previous year of \$3.8056.

The blended rate is an average rate of the residential, commercial, agricultural and personal property tax rates. It includes the \$0.04 temporary tax for Prop A, which ends in 2025. The rates include a 12-cent tax levy for Prop S general obligation bonds, which is offset by a 12-cent voluntary tax rate reduction (making Prop S a zero tax rate increase bond issue).

- Residential tax rate: \$3.4431
- Commercial tax rate: \$3.9025
- Agricultural tax rate: \$4.4036
- Personal property tax rate: \$4.5061

This year, assessed value increased 6.5 percent compared to the 1.4 percent increase to the consumer price index. The Hancock Amendment limits tax

student safety and accessibility and complete deferred maintenance without increasing the tax rate.

The replacement of Forder Elementary School's heating, ventilation and cooling systems began as soon as students left in June and was completed this summer. HVAC upgrades are cyclical, and the equipment at

Forder Elementary was last upgraded in 1994. The typical life cycle of an HVAC system is 20 years. If the system isn't upgraded towards the end of its life cycle, it leads to costly repairs.

Work was also recently completed on the baseball/softball field at Oakville High School. The field had safety issues related to poor drainage. Crews began work in July to regrade the field, add a new drainage and irrigation system and install a new fence and backstop. The field is ready for the OHS baseball team to use in the spring. Mehlville High School will also see field improvements in the next few years.

We're in the design phase for several other projects and anticipate bid packages will open this winter with construction to follow. We hope projects will be completed by the start of the 2024-2025 school year.

We're excited for what the next few years holds for the students and staff of Mehlville School District.

revenues to increase only up to inflation, or the consumer price index (CPI). The additional increase of assessed values results in decreased tax rates, so the tax revenue does not increase more than inflation. The total tax revenue estimate for Mehlville School District is \$77.9 million, up \$1.8 million from last year, or 2.3 percent.

About Prop A and Prop S

Voters approved Prop A in April 2016. Prop A has a 10-year sunset, and funds are being used to complete roofing and HVAC projects throughout the district. Prop A progress is being tracked on the district website, bit.ly/mehlvillepropa.

Off-campus adventures are at the heart of new PE class

Students in the new Adventure and Outdoor Pursuits class at Mehlville High School have already had a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity: canoeing on the Mississippi River.

This is the second year the class has been offered to Mehlville High School and Oakville High School students. But it's the first year students have been able to apply the skills they've learned to adventures off campus.

"We have the strengthening and conditioning classes, the fitness classes, team sports and lifetime sports, but this is for the kids who may not be interested in those courses, and outdoor activities have taken off lately," said Jill Wojewuczki, Mehlville High PE teacher.

Students spent the first few weeks of the school year learning about kayaking terminology and practicing techniques in the district's pool.

"We have been practicing how to turn, go faster, go backwards and using your momentum," said Mohamed Saady, Mehlville High senior. "If we need to make sharp turns or if we're in a sticky situation, we know how to get out of it with the techniques we've learned in class."



After three weeks of practicing in the pool, students set sail in canoes on the Mississippi River with the help of Big Muddy Adventures.

The students were able to apply those skills at the end of September when they went canoeing on the Mississippi River with the assistance of professionals from Big Muddy Adventures.

In addition to kayaking, students are going to learn and practice other outdoor activities like fishing, archery, rock climbing and hiking.

"I'm excited that the students get to take those things we're learning in the classroom, go outside and have those real-life experiences," said Wojewuczki.

Mehlville High and Oakville High students can take the Adventure and Outdoor Pursuits course their sophomore, junior or senior year as part of their physical education requirements for graduation. Adventure and Outdoor Pursuits is one of several new PE classes designed to increase fitness opportunities for students.

Mehlville School District selected to the League of Innovative Schools

Mehlville School District was selected to join the Digital Promise League of Innovative Schools, a coalition of forward-thinking schools across the country who are providing students with unique learning opportunities.

The Digital Promise League of Innovative Schools was founded by the U.S. Department of Education and White House in 2011. Mehlville School District is now one of just 125 districts nationwide to receive the distinction.

"We were encouraged to apply for the League based on our personalized learning programs," said Dr. Chris Gaines, Superintendent of Mehlville School District. "We are looking forward to sharing information about our programs with other League schools. We're even more excited to learn from other schools and other districts, so we can continue to grow and provide relevant opportunities for our students."

To be accepted into the League of Innovative Schools, districts must submit an application detailing educational leadership, innovative vision for learning, key achievements, evidence of results, and demonstrated commitment to equity and excellence. Membership in the League of Innovative Schools provides district leadership and teachers with opportunities to learn about best practices other school districts are using and ways to continue to provide students with new opportunities that prepare them for life after graduation.

Mehlville School District's application focused on our efforts to create more personalized learning experiences for our students through the creation of our Middle School Academies and MOSAIC Elementary School, as well as through high school programs like MyPath and the Early College Academy. These opportunities allow for student growth through development of Portrait of a Graduate traits and through collaboration and reflection with their peers. These programs also give our teachers the opportunity to try new things in their classrooms, leading to more innovative instruction.



MyPath allows high school students to continue to pursue topics they're passionate about once they have exhausted related courses. Kenan Mustafic, Mehlville High School senior, designed and constructed a remote-controlled plane his junior year that firefighters can use to drop retardant from above a fire.

Meghann Burke, MHS '99, Executive Director of the National Women's Soccer League Players Association

After a professional career as a goalkeeper in women's soccer leagues both in the U.S. and in Europe, Burke became a criminal defense and civil rights attorney. The award-winning attorney was lead counsel for the Campaign for Southern Equality, fighting for the rights of LGBTQ+ individuals. Burke is currently the Executive Director of NWSLPA, where she bargains on behalf of today's professional women's soccer players.

Dr. Matthew Kroenig, OHS '96, Political scientist, author and national security strategist


Dr. Kroenig began his career as a military analyst for the CIA and has become a trusted policy adviser on national security issues, including nuclear and terrorist network deterrence. Dr. Kroenig has advised for the White House, State Department, Pentagon, Congress and the intelligence community. He is an award-winning author, a regular commentator on news shows and is a professor of government and foreign service at Georgetown University.

Patrick Maroon, OHS '07, Professional hockey player for the National Hockey League

Maroon became a hometown hero in 2019 when he helped propel the St. Louis Blues to their first Stanley Cup win. The power forward would go on to win two more Stanley Cups, this time for the Tampa Bay Lightning, becoming just the fourth American player in history to win three consecutive championships. Maroon routinely gives back to the St. Louis community through his support of children's health and first responder organizations.

Ernie Perrica, MHS '88, Mehlville High School teacher and coach

Perrica spent his 30-year career in education at his alma mater where he built lasting relationships with students. The dedicated history teacher and coach played a key role in making all students, and especially those in the desegregation program, feel welcome and at home at school. Perrica has served as a mentor for countless MHS teachers and coaches and held numerous leadership positions on the high school campus. The empathetic educator embodies what it means to be a panther.





Dr. Aletha W. Tippett, MHS '69, Chemical engineer, physician and author

After beginning her career as a chemical engineer for Procter & Gamble, Dr. Aletha W. Tippett left the workforce to care for her two children and 12 foster children before beginning medical school at age 42. She would become a renowned expert in palliative wound care, organizing a conference for medical professionals around the world and authoring a book about her decades of experience treating patients with severe wounds and amputations.

Patrick Maroon, Alumni Hall of Fame inductee, was not able to attend the induction ceremony. However, he was welcomed into the Hall of Fame in September when he visited Oakville High School to share the Stanley Cup with students and staff.

Mehlville School District offers a full-day, tuition-free kindergarten program. Our high-quality teachers provide caring, personalized instruction that is developmentally appropriate and rigorous. Online registration for students entering kindergarten for the 2022-2023 school year opens Jan. 24. Families of children who turn 5 before Aug. 1, 2022, may register for kindergarten.

Our full-day kindergarten program provides exciting learning opportunities for young students.

"You can really see the growth when they start off in kindergarten," said Megan Mann, kindergarten teacher at Bierbaum Elementary School. "They learn a lot throughout the year, and it's exciting and fun to see them learn and explore new things."

Children begin kindergarten at different levels. Our talented teachers assess students at the start of the school year, then deliver personalized instruction for each student. In addition to instruction from their classroom teacher, students receive one-on-one support from our math and reading interventionists.

"When my oldest son started kindergarten, he was doing well in math, but his reading was a little bit behind," said Kevin Lupo, Bierbaum Elementary parent. "Mehlville School District gave him one-on-one help with reading to bring his level to where it was supposed to be by midyear."

Teachers work hard to develop lessons that are engaging for kindergarten-age students.

"The curriculum is ever-changing," said Tammie Werkmeister, kindergarten teacher at Rogers Elementary School. "As time has gone on, the academics have ramped up, but we find ways to teach the curriculum with play in mind. If you walk past a kindergarten classroom, it may look like they're playing, but it's actually an academic lesson that they're learning through play."

In addition to building relationships with students, teachers focus on building relationships with families as well.

"Mehlville School District has so many great resources for children," said Jessica DeLunas, Rogers Elementary parent. "The staff is really warm, accommodating and welcoming, and I know my children are getting what they need."

The community comes together to help refugees


