MyPath trio explores a career in music education

Mehlville High School seniors Sam Herbig, Tyler Langford and Luke Mitchell have shared a love of music since middle school. They're now exploring how to turn that passion into a career in music education by using the MyPath program to mentor middle school students.

The MyPath program allows students at MHS and Oakville High School to continue to pursue their interests after exhausting high school course offerings. Students develop their own curriculum, find mentors and monitor their progress throughout the year. Students can work individually or in small groups.

Herbig, Langford and Mitchell all plan to become music teachers, so they used MyPath as an opportunity to gain experience working with students. During the first semester, they visited band students at Buerkle Middle School and Washington Middle School to work on rhythm recognition. They helped middle schoolers learn how to count and clap rhythms before playing them on their instruments.

"It's made me think about how I could differentiate my rhythms and put more accents on notes when I'm playing music," said Gideon Krieg, an eighth-grader at Buerkle Middle School.

The mentorship has been mutually beneficial. Middle school students are improving their playing, while the MyPath trio is learning what skills they'll need to be a successful band teacher.

"It can be really hard to teach ... sometimes the way you learned it isn't the way they're going to learn it," said Herbig. "Practicing teaching and getting a taste of what it's like to teach middle school gives us a great reference of what it's like to be a teacher."

At the end of the first semester, the students made a formal presentation on their progress in music education to MHS and district staff.

In the second semester, the three are shifting their focus to working on pieces individually and in small groups to prepare the middle school students for state solo and ensemble competitions this spring. The work they're doing could have a lasting impact on the Mehlville High School band.

"They're inspiring the future of the band program," said James Hahn, Buerkle Middle School band director. "I think that is even more impactful than learning the notes and rhythms."

They also plan to use the second semester to finalize plans for college by preparing for auditions and applying for scholarships. All three say they have enjoyed their MyPath experience and plan to pursue a degree in music education. They believe the choice to complete their MyPath together has made a difference.

"Working together has kept us accountable, given us more resources and the opportunity to bounce ideas off each other that we wouldn't have had if we had done this alone," said Herbig.

"The first opinion is on the district's financial statements, in which we issued an unmodified opinion," said Desi Kirchhofer, lead auditor for Daniel Jones and Associates. "This means the audit was a clean audit. That is the best opinion that a district can receive and that we can issue."

"The second opinion we issued is in regards to the district's compliance with the requirements of Missouri's laws and regulations regarding budgetary and disbursement procedures, accurate disclosure by the district's records of attendance and average daily transportation, and other requirements as listed on the schedule of selected statistics. We found the district to be in compliance with state requirements relating to attendance, transportation and these budgetary procedures," Kirchhofer said.

Additionally, the auditors issued an unmodified opinion of the district's compliance with federal awards, the highest opinion a district can receive.

What I saw this winter ...

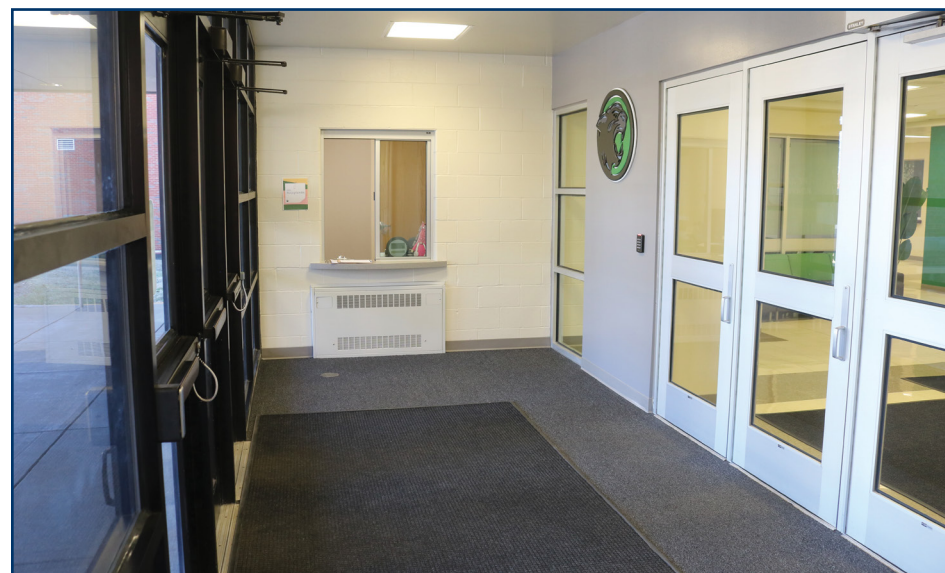

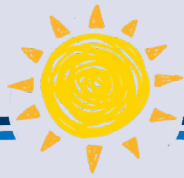
I saw student voices being respected and encouraged at both high schools. Mehlville High School and Oakville High School each held the second round of assistant principal interviews in February, and both had either a student panel or students on the interview committee. Both principals talked afterwards about the amazing insight our students provided to the process. Our students are amazing, and I love the opportunities we give them to be leaders!

I saw some young meteorologists at Washington Middle deeply engaged in their learning. Actually, I saw a group of students outside holding yellow plastic things above their heads while they looked at the sky. Upon investigation, I found out they were measuring wind speed. They told me they were using anemometers, explained to me how wind speed was measured and that the direction of the wind is specified by the direction it is coming from. The really cool part of the lesson is the group was going to four other places around campus to talk about how surroundings and topography could impact wind speed as well.

I've seen construction continue on security entrances throughout our school district. Recently, the security entrances were completed at Mehlville High School and John Cary Early Childhood Center. Security entrance construction is ongoing at Point Elementary School, and will begin this summer at Beasley Elementary, Forder Elementary, Wohlwend Elementary, Buerkle Middle and Oakville Middle. These projects are funded through taxpayer support of Prop S. Thank you for supporting safe facilities!

Student-organized event highlights the diversity of our community

One of Sahnam Mohabbat's favorite things about attending Oakville High School is the diversity of the student body. She approached the school administration about creating an event to highlight and celebrate the school's multiculturalism.

OHS Principal Brian Brennan loved the idea, and Sahnam began planning an International Culture Day. She first visited every advisory class at OHS to identify students interested in participating.

After compiling the list of students and countries, Sahnam planned an event that included a runway fashion show where students wore authentic clothing and carried flags from their home countries. Several groups of students – and even a few parents – also performed traditional dances in front of a cheering crowd of students and staff.

The countries represented were Afghanistan, Albania, Bosnia, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Germany, Guatemala, Iraq, Kurdistan, Mexico, Palestine, Turkey, Vietnam and Zimbabwe. The event was held on November 1, 2023.

“So many people were surprised by the dances and clothing from different countries,” said Sahnam. “It made an impact with people wanting to learn more about other people and their background.”

Sharing cultures with classmates is important to her because of her own experience. Sahnam's parents both came to the United States from Afghanistan, and her family has worked to preserve their traditions. At home, Sahnam and her family speak Dari to keep the language alive. Dari is a dialect of Farsi mostly spoken by Persians. They also cook food, dance and listen to music from Afghanistan.

“Even though I've never been to my home country, I want to keep that part of me always there,” said Sahnam. In addition to planning and emceeding the event, Sahnam also performed an Attan dance with other students from Afghanistan. The dance dates back more than three thousand years and differs depending on the area or tribe. Originally, men would perform the Attan before going into battle. Over time it became a dance performed by both men and women.

Keri Wilson, a French teacher at OHS, sponsors the school's International Club. She believes International Culture Day was important for students' sense of belonging, particularly for those who have recently moved to the United States.

“It means a lot for them to feel seen,” said Wilson. “A lot of times they're trying to blend in. It's nice for them to be appreciated for their heritage and culture and share that with others and see that others are interested in getting to know them better.”

Sahnam is still weighing her options for after graduation. She hopes to one day be a fashion creative director and is planning to pursue degrees in both fashion and business. Although she is graduating in the class of 2024, she hopes International Culture Day will continue next school year to highlight the diversity at Oakville High School.

Wilson hopes to build on the success of International Culture Day when Mehlville High School and Oakville High School students collaborate to host an International Festival on April 26. The event will include traditional fashion, music and dances, as well as cuisine, games and more.

Design lab students build new opportunities at their school

You can see the craftsmanship of design lab students throughout Bernard Middle School. Students in this class are improving their school by identifying needs and solving problems through industrial design.

Most recently, design lab students constructed portable stages for the theatre arts class and drama club. After going through the design process, Eric Heuerman's students cut and assembled plywood and two-by-six boards. They also added wheels and handles so the stages could easily be transported where needed. The stages are collapsible and can fold in half for easy storage.

"We talked about framing, the use of power tools like cordless drills and power saws," said Heuerman. "A lot of my students are interested in classes like this because it's something new and exciting to do."

Heuerman's students have helped other classes with necessary items, too. They previously constructed cornhole games and washer boxes for PE classes. They're also working to create wooden seat replacements for stools used in classrooms. Once the plastic seats break, it can be costly to replace. The new wooden seats are less expensive and more durable.

Theatre arts students currently perform in a section of Robert Summers' classroom. He says the new stages are going to improve their performances and let students know that they have the support of others in the school.

"It's the equivalent of putting an assignment on the fridge or in the hallway to elevate it," said Summers. "It shows the woodworking students that they're not just doing this for a grade. They are doing this to help people. It

shows the people in the theater classes that we are a community of artists and students who can come together and build something better than any of us could by ourselves."

Students like knowing their work is making a difference for their school.

"I like that they're benefiting from the work we're doing," said Claire Jablonski, an eighth-grade student. "It's going to be used for a while."

District to upgrade its parent portal/student information system

On July 1, Mehlville School District will switch to a new student information system, called Infinite Campus. Beginning with the 2024-2025 school year, parents will also have access to a new parent portal to see their child's grades, attendance and other records.

Infinite Campus is the most prominent student information system platform in the United States, serving 2,300 school districts. The district's current student information system, TylerSIS, was purchased by Infinite Campus.

Infinite Campus offers a robust set of features, and enhanced support and security. Parents will access their student's information through a website or through the Campus Parent app. Enrollment and course registration will also be available through Infinite Campus.

The first group of parents to use Infinite Campus will be incoming kindergarten families when they complete their registration in April.

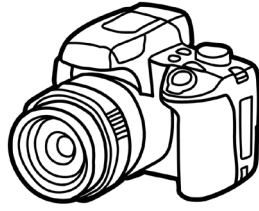

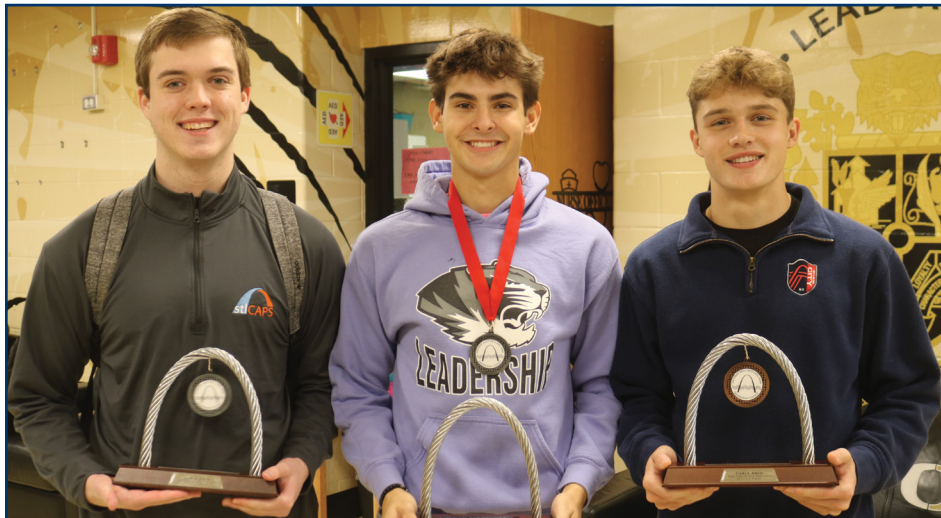
